♦ ATHENS EASTER HUNT IS THIS SATURDAY

The annual city-wide Easter Egg Hunt will be held this Saturday at the Athens Regional Park. The Athens Parks and Recreation Department says more than 10,000 eggs will be placed in the front of the park, beginning behind the red brick house. The hunt starts at 12 noon. Everyone must begin the hunt from a concrete walk as directed by the marshals. The hunt is for children ages 12 and under. The prizes this year include flat screen televisions from Comcast, baskets from The Sock Shop, Athens Movie Palace, the Kiwanis Club, and Athens Tiger Rock. There will be coupons from Applebee's, Michael's, Domino's, Dunkin' Donuts, and The Dairy Barn, and \$1 gold coins from Steve Songer, State Farm Insurance agent.

♦ MORE DISCOLORED WATER

Athens Utilities Board received several calls from customers reporting discolored water Tuesday night. Crews responded to all calls and the water was cleared up by running the faucet for a short period of time. AUB's Wayne Scarbrough says they believe the discoloration is the result of increased flow and pressure on the Hiwassee Utilities Commission water transmission line that brings treated water to Athens and points beyond. He says AUB is currently purchasing all of its water from HUC this week while final work is underway at AUB's water filter plant on Old Niota Road where upgrades have been under way. He says if you experience discolored water, simply run the faucet for a short time and it should clear right up.



SENATE PASSES BELL'S BROADBAND BILL The Tennessee Senate has passed a bill that could make it easier for rural areas to get access to the Internet. The bill is co-sponsored by Sen. Mike Bell of Riceville. It clears the way for electric co-ops to begin selling both Internet and video service. It may not necessarily be speedy, though. An amendment says Internet speeds would not have to be more than 10 megabytes per second, far less than the 25 megabytes considered to be broadband speed.
