FIRE ERUPTS AT WACKER PLANT

A fire Saturday morning at the Wacker Polysilicon Manufacturing Facility in Charleston, took about 4 hours to extinguish. The fire began on the 4th floor of their wastewater treatment building. The Bradley County Sheriff's office said that no chemicals were released in the fire and there was no danger to the public.

TWO AREA DROWNING VICTIMS

The body of 25 year-old Ryan Howard of Knoxville, was recovered from Fort Loudoun Lake on Saturday. Howard was reported missing on April 25th. A man from Fannin County, Georgia, 45 year-old Brian Bates, drowned last Thursday while fishing on the Ocoee River in Polk County. Crews from East Polk Fire & Rescue recovered his body on Friday.

TODAY IN HISTORY - May 6th

1624 - The Dutch settler Peter Minuit bought Manhattan Island from the Indians for \$25 worth of trinkets. Manhattan Island is now the main part of New York City.

1840 - The Penny Black was the world's first adhesive postage stamp used in a public postal system. It was first issued in Great Britain on May 1st 1840, but was not valid for use until 6 May. It features a profile of Queen Victoria.

1840 - A tornado that touched down in eastern Louisiana and crossed the Mississippi River into Natchez, Miss., killed 317 people - most of them on boats in the river.

1856 - Sigmund Freud, the father of psychoanalysis, was born in Freiberg, Moravia (present-day Pribor, Czech Republic).

1861 - Arkansas seceded from the Union.

1910 - Britain's King Edward VII died.

1915 - Babe Ruth of the Boston Red Sox hit the first of his 714 major league home runs in a 4-3 loss to the New York Yankees at the Polo Grounds.

1931 - Baseball player Willie Mays was born in Alabama. He played center field for the New York and San Francisco Giants and was one of a handful of major league players to hit over 50 home runs in one season.

1937 - The Hindenburg disaster took place. The German dirigible exploded in flames as it was landing at Lakehurst, New Jersey, after a trans-Atlantic crossing. Thirty-six people died. The crash was described in a live radio broadcast.

1954 - The world's first four-minute mile was run on this date in Oxford, England. The man who broke the barrier was 25-year-old Roger Bannister.

2002 - "Spider-Man" became the first movie to make more than \$100 million in its opening weekend.
