♦ AUB RATES TO JUMP IN JUNE

Local electric power rates for June will rise by about 7.3% COM-PARED TO May as Athens Utilities Board moves from springtime base rates to summer base rates. AUB's Wayne Scarbrough says the change in rates will increase the average residential user of 1200 kilowatt hours by \$7.60. He suggests you raise your thermostat to 75 degrees, use ceiling fans, and use curtains or awnings for windows to reduce solar heat gain from the sun.

FRIDAY'S MARKET REPORT: The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 99 points or 0.4% to 25,764. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was down 17 points or 0.6% to 2,860, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was down 82 points or 1.0% to 7,816.
