

Area Grant Checks Delivered

Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development Commissioner Bob Rolfe was in Athens on Friday, along with local elected officials and members of the Tennessee General Assembly, to present five checks for rural development grants totaling nearly \$4 million. Two of the checks were for broadband accessibility which will serve about 1,600 citizens in rural McMinn and Monroe counties who do not have access to internet service. Three checks will go to Monroe County, Englewood and Tellico Plains, which will assist those areas with infrastructure improvements, and health and safety initiatives. ~ A hospital in Cookeville, Tennessee hospital won't charge any medical fees for the dozens of patients who were affected by last week's deadly tornadoes. Cookeville Regional Medical Center reported that 82 people were treated for injuries after Tuesday's storms that ripped through Nashville and other Middle Tennessee counties. The hospital will bill each patient's insurance company and will accept the insurance payment as payment in full.

~ Passengers on board a cruise ship hit by the coronavirus will be flown to Georgia in the next two days. Georgia Governor Brian Kemp said that 34 Georgians and additional American citizens from the eastern United States, who are currently on the Grand Princess cruise ship off the California coast, will be securely transferred to Dobbins Air Reserve Base in Marietta. The passengers will undergo testing and be quarantined for possible exposure to COVID-19. They are expected to arrive at Dobbins late Monday or early Tuesday.

FRIDAY'S MARKET REPORT: U.S. stocks closed down as countries continued to battle the corona virus epidemic. All sectors were lower. The energy sector performed the worst as oil prices. The Commerce Department reported that the U.S. foreign-trade gap in goods and services fell 6.7% from the prior month to \$45.34. The Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 455 points, or 1.79%, for the week.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 257 points or 1.0% to 25,865. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was down 52 points or 1.7% to 2,972, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was down 163 points or 1.9% to 8,576.
