

COVID-19 Virus Update

The number of coronavirus cases in McMinn County now stands at four. Three of those patients have fully recovered. The fourth is being treated at Starr Regional Medical Center. Test results from a total of 313 people have been received. 309 of the tests came back negative. Around the area, Monroe County has 8 cases of the virus. Polk County reports 4. Meigs County has 3 cases. Bradley County is reporting 31 cases. Statewide, there were 5,308 cases as of Sunday evening. Statewide, 101 people have died from the coronavirus.

FREE CORONAVIRUS TESTING CONTINUES

Free tests for the coronavirus will take place each day this week from 9 a.m. until noon at the McMinn County Health Department off Highway 30 East behind the National Guard Armory. Anyone is welcome to receive a test. You do not have to be exhibiting symptoms and you do not have to have a doctor's order. Testing took place this past Friday and Saturday at several Health Departments in Southeast Tennessee. McMinn County had the largest participation per capita in Southeast Tennessee.
