McMinn Correction Officers Honored

Seven McMinn County Corrections Officers were recently honored with letters of commendation after saving an inmate from a suicide attempt.

According to Sheriff Joe Guy, the incident occurred on the night of May 29, when Deputy CO Chris Geisler decided to make an unscheduled visit to an inmate housing area.

"That, in and of itself, was above the call of duty," said Sheriff Guy. "The staff makes hourly checks on all inmates, but Deputy CO Geisler had caught up in his other work and decided on his own initiative to make an additional check of the housing area, and it was then that he found the inmate attempting to hang himself in his cell." Guy said Geisler im-

mediately called for the rest of the shift to respond, who called 911 and began lifesaving measures on the inmate who was unresponsive.






The other Deputies included Sgt Dusty Breeden, Corporal Willie Griffin, Deputy CO Shawn Emory, Deputy CO Boo Hampton, Deputy CO Kristina Shriver, and Deputy CO Veronica Pemberton. The inmate was transported by ambulance to a local hospital, and has since recovered and was returned to custody.

Each Deputy CO received a commendation letter that will remain in their personnel file. They also received the personal thanks of the Sheriff, Chief Deputy, and Jail Administrator. Guy's Photos include all employees except Corporal Griffin, who is on sick leave



Monday's Market Report

U.S. stocks closed mostly higher. The consumer discretionary sector led the market on homebuilder strength. Builder confidence in the housing market continues to rise, as the August NAHB Housing Market Index (HMI) had a reading of 78, tying its highest level ever. Amazon is reportedly being investigated by Germany's antitrust authority over its relationship with third-party sellers and how they set prices in the market place.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 86 points or 0.3% to 27,845. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was up 9 points or 0.3% to 3,382, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was up 110 points or 1.0% to 11,130.

Today In History

1587 - Virginia Dare became the first child of English parents to be born in present-day America, on what is now Roanoke Island in North Carolina. (However, the Roanoke colony ended up mysteriously disappearing.) 1862 - Dakota Indians began an uprising in Minnesota (the revolt was crushed by U.S. forces some six weeks later).

1894 - Congress established the Bureau of Immigration.

1920 - The 19th Amendment to the Constitution, guaranteeing all American women's right to vote, was ratified as Tennessee became the 36th state to approve it. 1963 - James Meredith became the first black student to graduate from the University of Mississippi. 1995 - Shannon Faulkner, who'd won a 2 1/2-year legal battle to become the first female cadet at The Citadel, quit the South Carolina military college after less than a week, most of it spent in the infirmary.
