

# **COVID Shots for All by April 5**

Governor Bill Lee has announced that all Tennessee adults will be eligible for COVOD-19 vaccination no later than April 5th. Tennesseans 55 and older are currently eligible for vaccinations. The governor says all Tennesseans age 16 and over will be able to get their shots by April 5th. Tennessee continues to see increasing supplies of vaccines, which allows the state to rapidly accelerate eligibility to receive the vaccination. The state expects to receive approximately 311,000 vaccine doses this week. TN Health Commissioner, Dr. Lisa Piercey, says Tennessee will now open COVID-19 vaccination to all eligible adults well ahead of the federal goal of May 1st. ## **Saluting a McMinn Woman**

March is National Women's History Month. Esther Nunley sent us this article about one of McMinn County's best known women, Febb Burn.

Febb Burn reached out to her son, State Rep. Harry T. Burn, in a letter urging him to vote for Women's Suffrage and to "be a good boy and help Mrs. Catt with her 'Rats." The word "rat" referred to ratification of the 19th Amendment.

That famous letter gave Rep. Burn one more reason to cast an "aye" in favor of Suffrage, and it gave Febb Burn notoriety. The legislation also made Tennessee famous for becoming the "perfect 36" that the Suffragists needed for ratification of the 19th Amendment.

Febb was born November 23, 1873, to Jonathan Thomas and Sara Snyder Ensminger. She graduated from U.S. Grant University (now Tennessee Wesleyan University) in the spring of 1894. She married James Lafayette Burn. They had four children: Harry Thomas, James Lane, Sara Margaret, and Otho Virginia.

Febb continued to run the farm in Niota after the sudden loss of her husband in 1916. She was an avid reader, keeping up on current affairs which caught her attention of the Suffrage movement. She felt Suffrage was necessary because it didn't seem right that she paid taxes but could not vote, when her male employees did not pay taxes but could vote. She made farming and her family her life. Febb died in 1945.
