Fire in Decatur on Monday



The Decatur Fire Department and Meigs County Emergency Services (MCES) responded to a structure fire at 2:00am on Monday, November 18.

Nobody was injured in the fire on the 300 block of E. Memorial Drive, according to MCES.

Upon arrival, the first engine began suppressing the blaze, preventing two nearby homes from also

catching on fire. Alongside the two responding teams, Tri-State Mutual Aid, Athens Fire Department, and McMinn County Fire Department all helped provide manpower. There is no word on how the fire started.

Athens City Council Recap

After the Athens City Council elected a new Mayor, Larry Eaton, and Vice Mayor, Jordan Curtis, on Tuesday night, the council approved several items on the consent agenda which included: Approval of Athens City Schools Budget Amendment #1 for Fiscal Year 2025; approved Revised Public Comment Rules;



Approved an annual contribution, not to exceed \$500, to the Veterans Day Parade through American Legion Post 68. Approved a bid from Tim's Fencing, Inc. of Knoxville to install replacement ornamental fencing at the Cedar Grove Cemetery for a cost not to exceed \$110,000. Approved purchase of a 2022 Ford F550 Altec bucket truck for the Public Works Department Traffic Control Division and place on surplus a 2008 Ford F550 Altec bucket truck, to be sold using GovDeals.com. Appointed former council member Francis Witt-McMahan to the Council Advisory Committee and also, a city employee, Mary Scudder, to the Council Advisory Committee. Under new business, the council agreed to appoint several individuals to various boards and committees on an interim basis. Further discussion on permanent appointments will be conducted at the next city work session in December. The council also heard reports from the Fire Chief, Brandon Ainsworth, Police Chief, Fred Schultz and new City Manager, Randall Dowling.

Grant Applications Open for Oak Ridge Natural Resource Restoration Projects

Officials managing a \$42 million fund for natural resource restoration at the Oak Ridge Reservation (ORR) have opened Requests for Proposals for grants and released a manual detailing the application process. The funding aims to restore resources affected by contamination at the ORR, a site involved in the Manhattan Project during the 1940s.

The program, overseen by trustees from the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC), the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA), the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), will support local projects that enhance or restore natural resources or improve public access to recreational opportunities. Eligible projects include habitat restoration, invasive species removal, land conservation, installation of permeable pavements, and public amenities like fishing piers, hiking trails, and boat launches. Grants are available to organizations and public entities for projects in Anderson, Roane, and parts of Loudon and Knox counties, with no minimum value and potential awards reaching millions of dollars.

Contamination released from the ORR negatively impacted natural resources and services from them. The goal is to restore natural resources in ways that match what was lost. Three workshops on the grants process will be held. They are:

What to Expect out of Tennessee for the Remainder of Their Season



Tennessee football is in a must-win situation as they enter the final two weeks of the regular season, needing not just victories but dominant performances to keep their playoff hopes alive. Currently projected as the first team out of the college football playoffs, the Vols are under pressure to prove their strength to the selection committee. Following a 14-point loss to Georgia, Tennessee must demonstrate their ability to bounce back with convincing wins, starting with their upcoming matchup against UTEP.

Historically, Tennessee has shown the ability to win in blowout fashion but has taken their foot off the gas in several games this season, including a close call against Oklahoma. The Vols now need to rekindle that aggressive edge, with their performance against UTEP expected to reflect their urgency. Tennessee is a 41.5-point favorite against the Miners, who come into the game after a bye week and a double-overtime win against Kennesaw State. UTEP, participating in a traditional SEC non-conference game, will also walk away with a \$1.6 million payday. *The game is set for Saturday, November 23, at 1 PM Eastern, airing on SEC Network+ and ESPN+.*

Tennessee's playoff aspirations hinge on not just defeating UTEP but also dominating Vanderbilt in their season finale. While Vanderbilt has been considered a strong win for teams like Texas, Tennessee's path to the playoffs requires them to "full-throttle" their opponents and leave no doubt about their credentials. Despite the setback against Georgia, the Vols still have multiple paths to the playoffs, but only if they finish the season with commanding victories to impress the committee. **Sources: El Paso Times** / **Sports Illustrated**
