## Athens Firefighters Honor 9/11 Heroes with Memorial Stair Climb



On September 11, the Athens Fire Department gathered at its training tower to honor the heroes and lives lost in the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. Firefighters participated in a memorial stair climb, a symbolic act reflecting the courage and sacrifice of first responders on that day.

In full firefighting gear, Athens firefighters climbed the tower 28 times each. The total climb equaled 110 stories—the same number of floors the FDNY firefighters faced while responding to the World Trade Center towers.

The stair climb served as a physical and emotional tribute to the 343 FDNY firefighters who died in the line of duty, along with police officers, paramedics, and thousands of civilians. With each

climb, participants reflected on the courage, sacrifice, and resilience shown on 9/11.

At the completion of the stair climb, a bell was rung in tribute to those who made the ultimate sacrifice. The ringing symbolized remembrance and respect for every life lost on September 11. The Athens Fire Department joined fire departments nationwide in conducting these memorial climbs as a way to en-

sure that the legacy of 9/11 is never forgotten.

#### 23RD ANNUAL PUMPKINTOWN SCHEDULED FOR SATURDAY, OCTOBER 11TH

Historic downtown Athens, Tennessee, McMinn County and Friendly City festivals are busy preparing for one of East Tennessee's favorite fall festivals-Pumpkintown: A festival of history, harvest and heritage on Saturday, October 11th. Scheduled from 10:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., this will be the 23rd annual event celebrating the rich cultural history of East Tennessee by highlighting Native American culture, local history and displaying elements of times past that are unique and interesting for all ages. Pumpkintown is among the area's premiere fall festivals and is one of the largest annually attended events with over 26,000 in attendance last year. The day-long celebrations brings to life the rich cultural history and heritage of the county and is named for a former McMinn County settlement. If you were to try to locate Pumpkintown today, you'd find yourself somewhere on Mayfield Dairy Farms about two miles North of downtown Athens and still within city limits. It's not certain when Pumpkintown began or who founded it. It is known that around 1820, a postmaster was named. Hugh Kelso, one of the first postmasters of McMinn County,, distributed mail arriving by stagecoach. The county itself was a newborn formed in 1819 and named after Joseph McMinn who governed Tennessee at the time. Pumpkintown was once described as a "home for transients and ne'er-do-wells" and it is surmised the name came from the native crop grown on the premises. Legend would have us believe that Pumpkintown was considered to be the actual site for what would become the City of Athens but that didn't quite happen. After much discussion and dissent, the permanent location of the county seat was located midpoint in the county on donated land and the little pioneer settlement was eventually absorbed into Athens. Friendly City Festival committee members expect the event will continue to provide a variety of events for all ages to enjoy. Old favorites will be returning, including the Scott Crisp Memorial PowWow, the infamous McMinn Regional Humane Society's Mutt Strutt and Pet Costume Contest, the 41st Annual McMinn County Living Heritage Museum Quilt Show, Mayfield Farm Park, Pumpkin Plinko, 300 arts, crafts, info and food booths and local shopping. There will be plenty of children's activities throughout the venue as well as a petting zoo, pony rides, in flatable's, larger than life dinosaurs and lots of interactive vendors for all ages. Pumpkintown is glad to welcome back the USS Ware Reunion to The Friendly City. Activities will include the Commemorative Brick Dedication Ceremony at Veterans Park along with a special exhibit at the Living Heritage Museum. The festival will also feature live entertainment on three stages throughout the day. ### Vols Push No. 3 Georgia to the Brink Before Falling 44-41 in Overtime



Under a roaring checkerboard of orange and white inside Neyland Stadium, Tennessee nearly pulled off its biggest win in nearly a decade. But after 60 minutes and an overtime thriller, the No. 15 Volunteers fell just short, 44-41, to No. 3 Georgia on Saturday night.

The Vols (2-1, 0-1 SEC) struck first and struck big. Quarterback Joey Aguilar, in just his third start at Tennessee, carved up the Bulldogs' vaunted defense with 371 yards and four touchdowns — three to Chris Brazzell II, who hauled in 177 yards receiving. Freshman Braylon Staley added 97 yards and a long touchdown grab that electrified the 101,915 fans. Tennessee's offense rolled up 508 total yards, more than Georgia has allowed in the Kirby Smart era against the Vols. Tennessee looked poised to win in regulation, driving into field-goal

range in the closing minute. But a late penalty pushed Max Gilbert's potential game-winner back to 43 yards, and the kick sailed wide. The Volunteers briefly regained hope in overtime when Gilbert connected from 42 yards, but Georgia answered with a one-yard touchdown run by Josh McCray to end it.

Georgia quarterback Gunner Stockton — who had struggled with accuracy in earlier games, including a sluggish showing against Austin Peay — steadied himself late, finishing with 287 passing yards and two touchdowns while adding two more on the ground. His fourth-quarter strike to London Humphreys, followed by a two-point conversion to Zachariah Branch, tied the game at 38 with under three minutes left. The Bulldogs' depth was tested as right guard Juan Gaston and tight end Ethan Barbour sat out with injuries, while Tennessee played without top cornerbacks Jermod McCoy and Rickey Gibson. Even so, the Vols' defense held Georgia to just 30 points through three quarters before Stockton's rally.

The near-upset snapped Tennessee's nine-game home winning streak, but it also sent a message. Neyland Stadium was deafening, the checkered stands rattled the visitors, and the Vols' mix of balance — 246 yards rushing against Syracuse earlier this season paired with Aguilar's passing — proved they can challenge the SEC's best. *The Vols host UAB next week, while Georgia (3-0, 1-0 SEC) leaves Knox-ville still unbeaten but no longer untouchable.
